A NEW YEAR MESSAGE

You are kind, God! Please have pity on me. You are always merciful! Please wipe away my sins. Wash me clean from all of my sin and guilt. Psalm 51:1-2

I cannot begin to think how many times I have prayed this prayer. We have all sinned against God. The word of God tells us that if we sin against God that we must pray and ask for forgiveness and it will be done. Sounds too easy, right?

When I was a kid I would get in trouble a lot! And once I realized that I did something wrong—something that really hurt someone's feelings—I had to ask for forgiveness from that person. Even after I apologized, some people just wouldn't let go of what I had done. They would hold it over my head to make me feel even worse about it (I have to admit that I am guilty of doing exactly the same thing to others).

We say that we forgive a person, but we don't really forgive them. Instead, what we are doing is just forgiving them for that one moment. The grievance is still in our minds and hearts and we hold on to it with both hands.

When we do something wrong to God and we ask for forgiveness, it's forgiven. Bam! That's all. God will not hold the grievance over our heads. God loves us so much that when we do something bad and then ask for forgiveness from the bottom of our hearts, he forgives us.

This is a season of not keeping score of the wrongs of others. It is easier to ask others not to keep a scorecard on our wrongdoing, but it is very difficult not to keep score on others. It is a challenge to give up holding grudges for the new year and to practice forgiveness. So the next time someone hurts you and then asks for forgiveness, forgive them and try not to hold it against them. Once they see that you're doing that, perhaps they will try and do the same.

EPIPHANY & THE WISE MEN

Epiphany is celebrated on Jan 6th. It is the time the Three Wise Men gave their gifts to Jesus.

Melchior was the king of Arabia and India and the eldest of the three kings at the age 116. His appearance substantiated his position: his beard was long and white and a dramatic contrast to the crimson robes that were his signature color. Melchior was said to have waited a lifetime for a star to appear in the heavens. Once it did, there was no question that he was destined to join the other two kings for a journey to Bethlehem. Melchior's gift was gold. It is written that he also brought silks and precious stones to Bethlehem. Eight days after seeing Jesus in the stable, Melchior went to the temple to pray and then peacefully died with his lifelong mission fulfilled.

Balthazar was the Prince of Africa and the King of Saba. Of the three kings, he was the one who traveled the farthest. His journey had been so long and exhausting that by the time he met the other two kings, his clothing was in tatters. It is unclear whether he packed special clothing to wear once he arrived in Bethlehem or if the other two kings gave him clothing. Balthazar's gift was myrrh (a true gift of his homeland) and symbolized suffering. Myrrh is an aromatic resin that comes from the bark of thorny, African trees. It was prized throughout the Holy Land because it was said to deter vermin from invading the house. On the day of the Feast of the Epiphany, Balthazar died after saying prayers at the temple. He was 112. Just days after burying Melchior, Gaspar found himself burying his other travel companion.

Gaspar (also known as Gaspard, Caspar, and Jaspar) was the youngest of the three kings at 109 years of age. He was actually the king of many kingdoms and had many titles including "King of Tharsis" and "Emperor of the World." In his homeland, he was said to have lived in such splendor that he sat only on pillows fashioned of gold-embellished tapestry. This regal king is most often depicted wearing an elegant turban. Lyric poets have described Gaspar's headdress as wrapping around his head like a blossom of almond trees. Gaspar's gift was frankincense. This fragrant, African aromatic symbolized prayer. This gift was so beautiful that some stories tell of Gaspar spilling a chest of diamonds before the child.

Dew Year Resolutions

Did you know that the beginning of the year used to be celebrated on March 1st. Julius Caesar changed the beginning of the year to be January 1st. January is named for Janus who is the Roman god of beginnings and endings.

Some mornings it's just not that easy to get my act together!

If you are an IRA owner and are over age 70½ this year, you must take your required minimum distribution (RMD) by the end of the year. Normally any IRA distribution, including your RMD, is taxable to you, but a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) is tax-free as long as certain rules are followed.

Under the IRA Qualified Charitable Distribution rules, if you are actually age 70½ or older on the date of the distribution, you can give your RMD or any amount up to \$100,000 directly to charity tax-free. The IRA funds must be transferred directly to a qualified charity. The charitable donation from your IRA can satisfy your RMD for the year. You can't take a tax deduction for the charitable contribution - but, unless you itemize deductions, you don't get a tax deduction for charitable contributions.

The reason why you likely will save taxes using a QCD is because it's a tax-free distribution. Because it's tax free, it won't increase your adjusted gross income (AGI) and thus won't affect items on your federal income tax return that are negatively impacted by a higher AGI.

If you are over age 70½ and have an IRA, consider using the QCD to pay your pledge to our church. It should save you money! Ask your tax professional if you have any questions.
