



### Worship Wonderings

Recently the confirmation class asked an interesting question. Actually, that lively group of young people ask *many* interesting questions! But this one is something that sticks with me because they aren't the only ones who've asked about it.

"Why do we say we believe in the holy catholic church when we're Presbyterians not Catholics?"

Just so you know how this came about:

Yes. The class and I were reviewing Reformed creeds of belief. We did so as a way of not only understanding who we are as a people of faith, but as a way of preparing to start writing our own personal creeds. And we were focusing our study on the Apostle's Creed, a statement of core things we hold to be true in our hearts.

Most Sundays in our worship service we share in an Affirmation of Faith. At those moments we profess our faith, using one of the 12 official creeds of the PC(USA). Often we say the most basic of statements: the Apostles Creed. But sometime we use words form the Nicene Creed or the Brief Statement of Faith or perhaps words from Westminster or the Scot's or even Belhar. That practice raises another question: "Why are there so many different creeds?"

Well... Martin Luther once said something like 'We are the church Reformed and always being reformed.' By that he meant that God was forever working with and through us to be the body of Christ in the world in the here and now. The earliest followers of Jesus first needed to organize their basic beliefs so that other people could understand who – and whose – they were in the world. A brief commentary on how they were different from those who followed Zeus or Baal or any other of the gods. So they focused their words on who God and Jesus were. They also briefly commented on their belief in the Holy Spirit and things like the resurrection.

One of those other things was that they believed the body of Christ wasn't limited to just one geographic region or people, but was available and recognized throughout the world –universally as it were. And they used the word "catholic" to convey that idea. That word originate in ancient Greek and means "universally, according to the whole, involving all or of interest to all." So when we say we believe in the holy catholic Church, we mean we believe Christ's body – the Church – can be and is everywhere.

It was only 1500 years later, during the Reformation period, when Luther and Calvin and a host of others were stepping away from the Pope's church that people felt the need to address faith issues of the day in writing. Between 1531 and 1649 four different statements of faith were written to set out beliefs about such diverse topics as the meaning of good works to one's salvation; the value of the civil magistrate as opposed to a papal dominated system of rules and regulations; who could officiate and receive communion and baptism; celibacy, marriage and the clergy, the payment of indulgences, and many, many more.

While over time there were many arguments over the clauses in these statements, it wasn't until the mid-twentieth century that the Presbyterian Church felt the Holy Spirit urging them to address concerns of faith that were unheard of 500 years earlier. Beginning with accepting the Confession of Barmen, which spoke out against the Nazi appropriation of Christ's Church to support their ideologies over Christ's commission, several new faith affirmations have been included into the PC(USA) constitution.

The General Assembly approved the Confession of 1967, C-67 as it is known, helps modern-day followers of Christ to respond faithfully when faced with issues like racial discrimination and class conflict. To celebrate the reunification of the Northern and Southern Presbyterian denominations, the Assembly approved the Brief Statement of Faith for congregational use. Just 80 lines long, this creed shapes our understanding of the Triune God and who we are in relationship to God through a contemporary perspective. Most recently, the denomination accepted and affirmed the Confession of Belhar which came to us from the Church in South Africa. This creed helps develop our understanding of human complicitness in sin and how the body of Christ should respond to systemic injustice.

To think that Christ is ever present in our lives, ever speaking to new issues as they arise, keeps our faith fresh and relevant. Saying what we believe during worship helps remind us of our values as Presbyterian and Reformed people – and of Jesus' hope for this world. So whether the words of the creed come to us from the Nicene or Belhar statements of faith, they assure us of who and whose we are... and challenge us to live into our calling every day of our lives!


