

## A Message from Pastor Sara

#### **Dyngus Day**

In Poland and other Central European countries, Dyngus Day, the Monday after Easter, is celebrated by boys and girls dumping water on one another, and whacking one another with pussy willows. One can prevent being soaked by presenting the soaker with a pisanki, or an Easter egg. One might also knock on doors throughout a village to beg for handouts of leftovers from Easter Supper, whether it be sausage, bacon, or dessert. The tradition did not really carry on in the United States for whatever reason, but in the last fifteen years or so, Dyngus Day celebrations have grown. Cleveland has had a Dyngus Day celebration that has grown to almost 20,000 people each non-pandemic year. They gather in the streets with squirt guns, Polish flags, pierogi and sausage food trucks, and polka music. It is always held on the Monday after Easter, just like in the old country.

Though Dyngus Day has taken on a "Polish Pride" kind of vibe, I like the idea of exuberant celebrations the day after Easter. We often continue to celebrate Christmas for days after the holiday is over, but we do not tend to do that with Easter. Why not? As St. Augustine allegedly said, "We are Easter people, and alleluia is our song."

Biblical scholar and Anglican Bishop N.T. Wright points out that the 40 days prior to Easter, Lent, are spent being subdued, and rightfully so. It is good and right for us to focus on the sacrifices Christ made on our behalf. It is good and right for us to take a long look at the depths of Christ's love for us, which was revealed to us through his passion. But to end that forty days with just one day of celebration is a little underwhelming. He writes:"...

after forty days of Lenten fasts, and three days of deep and serious concentration on the meaning of the cross, we have precisely one morning of Easter festivities...

...we should make Easter a forty-day celebration. If Lent is that long, Easter should be at least that long, all the way to Ascension. We should meet regularly for Easter parties. We should drink champagne at breakfast. We should renew baptismal vows with splashing water all over the place. And we should sing and dance and blow trumpets and put out banners in the streets. And we should invite the homeless people to parties and we should go around town doing random acts of generosity and celebration. We should be doing things which would make our sober and serious neighbors say, "What is the meaning of this outrageous party?"

May we celebrate Easter the way we should, with joy, hospitality, and love. We are Easter people, and alleluia is our song.

I don't know about you, but I never considered Aschsah before, even though I have read the book of Judges a number of times. As I was reading this week, a devotion on Judges and Ashsah (also Aksah) caught my eye. Here it is:

**Give me a Blessing.** Charles Spurgeon preached a wonderful sermon on Judges 1:12-15 titled, *Aschsah's Asking, A Pattern of Prayer*. Spurgeon showed how the request from a daughter (Aschsah) to a father (Caleb) gives us a "parable of prayer."

- 1. Aschsah was a good example because she thought about what she wanted before she went to her father. Before you pray, know what you need before God. She came to God with a very definite request that had been considered beforehand. "Think what you are going to ask before you begin to pray, and then pray like business men. This woman does not say to her father, 'Father, listen to me,' and then utter some pretty little oration about nothing; but she knows what she is going to ask for, and why she is going to ask it." (Spurgeon)
- 2. Aschsah was a good example because she asked for help with her request, asking her husband she urged him to ask her father for a field. "A friend, some time ago, said to me, 'My dear pastor, whenever I cannot pray for myself, and there are times when I feel shut up about myself, I always take to praying for you: 'God bless him, at any rate!' and I have not long been praying for you before I begin to feel able to pray for myself.' I should like to come in for many of those odd bits of prayer. Whenever any of you get stuck in the mud, do pray for me. It will do you good, and I shall get a blessing." (Spurgeon)

Spurgeon lists 11 more reasons why Aschsah"s prayer was a good example. To be continued....
