A Message From Your Pastor Rev. Sara Hodsden

Every Saturday night, I listen to a sermon preached by a Scottish pastor I met four years ago. On March 13th, she began her sermon by showing what her husband had given her for Mother's Day. In the UK and Ireland, Mother's Day is celebrated on the Fourth Sunday of Lent, rather than the second Sunday of May. This usually falls sometime in March, while we are still experiencing cold and snow.. I always associate Mother's Day with spring and flowers!

This got me wondering about the history of Mother's Day in the UK. As I said, it is always the Fourth Sunday in Lent. Also unlike our Mother's Day, they have been observing what they call "Mothering Sunday" since the 1600's. The original intent of Mothering Sunday was for Christians to visit their "mother church" for worship. Even those who were servants would have the day off to go and worship where they were baptized. Over time, Mothering Sunday came to include the celebration of mothers.

I love celebrating my mother and grandmothers on Mother's Day, but the idea of also celebrating the Church as our spiritual mother is worth taking a look at. St. Cyprian wrote "No one can have God as Father who does not have the church as Mother." The function of the Church is to nurture and guide our faith, just as a good mother nurtures and guides her children.

A recent poll shows that 67% of people consider themselves to be "very" or "moderately religious". The same poll shows that 54% of people "seldom" or "never attend religious services." Church participation has now become something one might add-on in the midst of other religious choices. But for almost 2000 years, Christians never would have dreamed one would attempt to have a relationship with God without involving the Church. It would be like trying to be born without having a mother.

Many would point to the individualistic nature of our culture and say this is the cause. We would do well to admit that although individualism may be a reason, sometimes the Church drives people away through its bad behavior. We can't, by ourselves, change the individualism factor. We can, however, pray for forgiveness for past hurts we've caused, and for God to give us a spirit of nurture and loving-kindness--for God to transform the Church into a place which radiates with not only the Father's love, but a mother's love.

Thanks be to God to the mothers in our lives who blessed us. Thanks be to God for Mother Church, who taught us the faith. Thanks be to God, who gives us the gift of mothering believers. May we bear this responsibility with joy and enthusiasm!
