

And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." 
Matthew 28:18-20

Making disciples, and baptizing them: That's the task Jesus gives to his followers just before his ascension. If one is a follower of Christ, then one must be in the business of baptizing and disciple-making. One of the ways the modern church has engaged in baptizing and disciple-making is through Sunday School. In fact, Sunday School programs have been such a part of the American church that we might think that "Sunday School" always existed. In fact, the Sunday School movement has only been a part of the Christian church for about 220 years. The Sunday School movement began in England in 1790. A writer named Robert Raikes was visiting a friend, and observed several small children cussing, fighting, and gambling. He learned that the children were child laborers, meaning that they worked long shifts six days a week, and were not enrolled in school. A woman told him t hat what he observed that evening was nothing. When the children had the whole day off, they really caused trouble. Raikes was a Christian, and he wondered what he could do for the children. As a writer and a newspaper publisher, he knew the benefits of literacy. As a Christian, he knew the benefit of being able to read the Bible. He put two and two together and founded a "Sunday School". The children would learn to read and write, they would learn the stories of Scripture, and they would attend worship service. Three years after the program started, the area manufacturers claimed to see a difference in the behavior of the children: "They have been transformed from the shape of wolves and tigers to that of men," one would write. The Sunday School movement spread throughout England, and then to our United States. As time went on, child labor was outlawed and public education became the norm. It was then that Sunday School became what most of us came to know as children. It was an educational setting for faith instruction. Soon, churches transitioned from providing literacy education to providing sports and social activities. This is when the YMCA and the YWCA were formed. Christian Education programs have changed with the times, and it seems that today we are seeing huge cultural changes that impact the way churches must think about Christian Education. It seems that the world is offering children everything the church used to offer them--except for the one thing they need the most, Jesus. Over the past year, the Christian Education Committee has been trying to imagine what a Christian Education program might be in our modern times. How can we best share the Good News of Jesus Christ with families today? A look at the statistics is pretty grim. You may have seen the headlines that for the first time in Pew Research history, less than 50 percent of Americans belong to a church. The younger the age demographic, the less likely it is that the individual will be a member of a church. In fact, only six percent of Generation Z, and eight percent of millennials would call themselves mainline Protestant. 50 percent of Generation Z have never attended church. Ever. And this is the generation that is starting to have children. So how can we reach out to people in our community who have never been to church before? The days of "If we build it, they will come," are over. We need to be intentional in the way we reach out to our surrounding community. At the same time, our Huron community's fastest growing population is retired people, many of whom would like an outlet where they can participate in working with younger people (it keeps one young!). The CE Committee, and the Session approved the creation of the position "Children's Ministry Coordinator." This individual will be a bridge-builder. They will not be a traditional Christian Education Director. They most likely will not be teaching Sunday School themselves. Instead, their job will be to connect the very talented people of our church with opportunities to serve, and to provide the resources needed to engage with children and families in our community. They will help us to find new and exciting ways to reach out to younger generations that don't darken the door of a church building on Sundays. I commend the CE Committee and the Session for taking this bold and creative step. We must find new ways of outreach in order to continue making disciples. 
