A Message from your Pastor

On Wednesday, May 19th, Corey Kluber pitched a no-hitter. The same Corey Kluber who was the two-time Cy Young winning Cleveland pitching ace for several years in a row. I always used to pay close attention to games when Corey Kluber was pitching, because I believed that he could toss a no-hitter. The day we moved Thomas to college, August 23rd, 2017, I went to the Indians' game that night, because Corey Kluber was pitching. Incidentally, that was the last game the Indians lost prior to their 22 game winning streak.

Kluber was traded to the Texas Rangers before the 2020 season. He only pitched one inning, and was taken out of the game with a torn muscle near his shoulder. It ended his season. He became a free agent, and was signed to an audition with the Yankees before spring training this year.

He had a rocky April this year. His father, Jim Kluber, says that it seemed like his son had lost his well-known focus. The senior Kluber reminded his son of the book The Mental ABC's of Pitching, which teaches the most important pitch of the game is the next pitch, no matter what has taken place on the field prior.

We have a human tendency to beat ourselves up over things we have said or done in the past. It's not unlike a baseball pitcher being rattled by a player hitting a home run, or an error on the field. Instead of focusing on what is going on in the present, we become bogged down with the past. It happens to individuals, it happens to families, it happens to churches.

In Scripture, the Israelites went through a period of exile which was brought on by their own idolatry and faithlessness. They were forced to leave the Promised Land they had inhabited and ruled over for centuries, and were made subjects of the Babylonian rulers. In exile, many lamented their sins, and wondered whether God had abandoned them.

The prophet Isaiah spoke to them to let them know that what had happened in the past was forgiven, gone, and forgotten. "Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the desert and streams in the wasteland." (Isaiah 43:18-19)

God is always doing a new thing. Regardless of our past, through the grace of God given us in Christ Jesus, he is always doing a new thing. The most important thing you are doing is whatever you are doing right now. Let's focus our eyes on the future, not the past, and let God do a new thing in us!

(His dad joked that they're running out of room for *people!*! J His mom, a singer and artist, is looking forward to getting it repaired and to painting it decoratively!!)

While here, his parents expressed to me (and wanted me to share) their deepest appreciation for this congregation providing such a wonderful spiritual AND musical "home" for Matthew, and for being so generous, not only with hospitality, but also with the wonderful monetary gift given him upon his departure. And ...they both expressed what a BEAUTIFUL church building it was and a 'lovely town!! Matthew, also, expressed his DEEPEST appreciation for the generous gift and the wonderful congregational "home!" UPDATE: For those who know/remember Mitch, our previous Oberlin organist who was with us for five years, I am delighted to report that he has been selected as *one of twelve finalist* in the prestigious 2021 International St. Albans Organ Competition (England) ! He joins finalists from USA, United Kingdom, France, the Netherlands, Austria, Lithuania, and Germany!!! Quite an honor for 'our' Mitch!!

It is our hope that the Chancel Choir will be able to reconvene for the fall!! We are ALL eager to resume our regular choir, and pray for a new organist/accompanist for the fall from Oberlin!! We're working toward that goal and appreciate any assistance from the congregation!!



Olympic VBS




The United Methodist Church is hosting our VBS this year. We will have an Olympic theme. More information will be passed along as plans are solidified.
