According to my phone, from July 24-August 14, I walked 102.35 miles. I flew 4,167 miles. I took 215 miles worth of trains and subways. It was quite a pilgrimage! Thank you all for the time off for this once in a lifetime opportunity.

I have enough material to fill several newsletters and sermons, so you will surely hear much about the journey. In addition, I plan on putting together a presentation to share some of my adventures with you.

Our pilgrimage crew included four Americans and eight British; four Presbyterians and eight Church of England clergy and laity. It was refreshing to hear a British perspective on the United States, even as our views on the United Kingdom refreshed them. (What do they think of that rascal, Prince Harry, anyway?)

For me, the trip's highlight was the three days we spent on Inis Oirr, the smallest of the Arran Islands. I'll share much more about this spiritual place, but for now, I want to share a situation that swelled my heart with joy.

We were staying in a small hotel on this island. James and I heard some locals playing music in the hotel pub, so we went down. We met our fellow pilgrim, Eunice, who also wanted to hear music. Four musicians were playing--one fiddler, one harpist, one flutist, and one guitarist, who also was the singer. They all looked to be in their 20s or 30s. Soon, a more seasoned man, probably in his 70s, strolled up and began singing lead on several songs.

After a few songs, he looked at our table and approached us. "Have you been singing with the group long?" I asked. "Oh, no, I just got here tonight. I don't know these people, but I know the

music." I wasn't surprised. I've been to a few pubs with Irish traditional music, and it is normal for anyone who wants to participate to join in, whether with their instruments or their voices. Some even join in by dancing.

I looked at the joy in the eyes of all the people gathered and soaked in the joy and merriment, and it made me think about the worldwide Christian community. We have a common song--the song of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We can all sing about how he has touched, guided, comforted, and empowered us. It doesn't matter how old or how young you are. It doesn't matter if you're from County Clare or County Kerry. The verses vary, but the song is the same. I Corinthians 12 teaches us that though there are many gifts, the same Spirit is behind them all.

We share a common song as disciples of Christ, not only with one another but with Christians everywhere. Wherever and whenever the joyful strains of the Gospel are rightfully proclaimed, in word or deed, may we join in the song with as much vigor as one finds at a pub late at night in Ireland.



Building and Grounds Update

July and August have been very busy months for the Building and Grounds Committee.

- In July, we made over \$1000 in parking fees from Riverfest. Thanks to all who served as cashiers and traffic coordinators!
- In August, we needed to replace the roof over the sanctuary. We discovered water spots on the ceiling and learned that our roof had some holes in it. There was also rotted wood beams which needed replacement. Because this was a pressing matter, Session approved a bid from Horvath Roofing for \$26,000 to replace the wood and the roof. We were happy to use a local company, and very pleased with the quick turnaround on the work.
- We needed to replace a part on one of our boilers, but they do seem to be in working order and are ready for the cooler temperatures which are on the way.

Rev. David Aber, a long time minister here, used to say to me "you're a Born Presbyterian." I think he was right, but it took me until I was in my teens to realize it.

As a child I had attended a Baptist church. The people were very nice. But by the time I was 8 years old I knew I was going to go to hell —not just me, but my brothers and sisters (there were 11 of us). My sisters used lipstick—and nail polish! My brothers smoked! And they all danced—and went to movies! There was just no hope for any of them, and I assumed I'd be going with them because I could hardly wait to do all these things (except smoking). I was pretty sure there was no hope, and I just felt scared an sick much of the time.

But God had a different plan. When I was in my teens a teacher invited me to the Presbyterian church in Lorain. I went several times before I realized that God was actually a LOVING GOD!!! He really wanted us to find joy in our lives, and he was just waiting for me to realize he just loved me to pieces and wanted me to love him back. WOW!!! Because of that, as many of you know, I joined the Huron Presbyterian Church over 50 years ago...It's home.

I've done a variety of jobs here. I typed George Bell's sermons (mostly to correct his spelling). These were the days of carbon copies and a mimeograph machine. We thought we were pretty fine when we had a "machine" to fold them.

The church had the standard 3 board system of government. I started as a lowly deacon, and sat through one whole meeting discussing the terrible problem of someone not putting the sugar away properly.

When I became an elder I discovered a whole new world. Lots of dedicated, talented, faithful people. But that wasn't all I found. There was confusion as to which board was responsible for what areas, which meant there was some overlapping and treading on toes. And then there were gaps where one group assumed it was somebody else's duty. And when it came to budget—Which board? Which committee? Who knew?

At that time I was pretty shy (I really was!), but the confusion made me crazy. So I started on a campaign to organize it. George Bell wasn't too happy with me, but all of a sudden learned that I really was kind of a "pushy broad". Well, Session got behind the idea, and with the vote of the congregation we created the unicameral system we have today.

For some years after that, after my husband died, I felt it necessary to get a real job. First I became director of Downtown Waterfront Development as we worked with a number of faithful Sandusky merchants and citizens along with the city to begin with the early steps of what has become the revitalization of Sandusky's downtown.

In the process we interested a small group of people—including our own Bill and Sharon Roose—to buy Sandusky's beautiful old Post Office building and create the Merry-Go-Round Museum. I agreed to be the director for some years until my retirement. It's wonderful to see it still bringing in joy to people over thirty years after it opened.

After that I worked with a builder to build homes. Then worked with Shawnee Indians. I thank God every day for giving me the opportunity to have some many diverse and exciting jobs, and providing everything I needed to do them,


Now I am truly retired—And loving it!
