Steeple Notes

From Pastor Sara

As I watch the evening news and see the devastation in the land where Jesus walked, I am heartbroken. I am heartbroken for the residents of the kibbutzes near Gaza who were brutally attacked, raped, murdered, tortured, and kidnapped. I am heartbroken for the innocent civilians of Gaza, who, through no fault of their own, stand between the weapons of Hamas and Israel. I continue to be heartbroken for the people of Ukraine, who have also suffered much because of war.

I am heartbroken when I see the vitriol tossed between "sides" in the wars. I never believed in my lifetime I would see it socially acceptable to make antisemitic remarks. I grieve when people want to lump all Arabs, whether Christian or Muslim, as "terrorists."

Micah was a minor prophet who prophesied around the same time as Isaiah, Hosea, and Amos, following the fall of the northern kingdom of Israel but before Assyria attacked the southern kingdom of Judah. The beginning of Micah warns God's people that because of their cruelty toward others, there would be consequences.

But Micah was not the prophet the kings would listen to. Other prophets would tell the kings they were infallible, that God had riches for them, and that all was hunky-dory. Surprise, surprise: These were the prophets the kings chose to listen to. But Micah continued to prophesy, and the destruction of the kingdom of Judah happened, just as he said.

However, if you continue in Micah, there are words of hope. The fourth chapter begins, "In the last days the mountain of the Lord's temple will be established as the highest of the

mountains; it will be exalted above the hills, and peoples will stream to it." After the heartache and destruction, the Lord will remain, and his temple will be the highest of all mountains. It will be such an incredible sight that people of all ethnicities, cultures, and socio-economic statuses will stream to it. They will hear the word of the Lord, and then "...they will beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation will not take up sword against nation, nor will they train for war anymore. Everyone will sit under their own vine and under their own fig tree, and no one will make them afraid, for the Lord Almighty has spoken."

This is the way of things. Humans often exchange good for evil, truth for lies, and peace for violence. However, take heart. The current way of things will end, and God's Kingdom will be established as promised through Christ. There will be peace.

In the meantime, God calls us to work toward peace not just on a global scale but in our nation, state, communities, neighborhoods, and families. "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called children of God." We don't always agree with what working toward peace looks like. As Christians, we can agree that living in the pattern of Christ, allowing the Holy Spirit to guide us, and understanding that all human beings are made in the image of God is the place to start.

Pray for this broken world. Grieve over the loss of life. Work toward peace. Believe in God's promises. The swords will become plowshares because it is what God promises. Amen.


Thanksgiving Break will be November 20-23!


