A MESSAGE FROM YOUR PASTOR

Unless you've been living under a rock, you know that on Monday, April 8th, we will be in the path of a total solar eclipse.

Although this has been going on since creation, the oldest recorded solar eclipse was 4,000 or so years ago by the Chinese. Ancient Chinese mythology explained that a celestial dragon had eaten the sun. People would make noise by shouting and banging drums to scare the dragon away. Native American Choctaw had a similar tale: a squirrel eating the sun instead of a dragon. In Indian mythology, a demon named Rahu tried to sneak into the banquet of the gods to drink the nectar that gave immortality. When Vishnu caught him, he beheaded Rahu, and the eclipse was his head flying across space, blocking the sun. The Incans believed that the eclipse was their sun god, Inti, expressing his anger. They would gather and determine an appropriate sacrifice. Sadly, this was often a human sacrifice.

The scientific explanation for a total solar eclipse is that the moon passes between the sun and Earth, blocking the light from the sun and casting a shadow on Earth. We know the sun never really disappears. There is no dragon or squirrel munching away at the sun (I'd imagine it was too hot to eat!), no head flinging across the sky, and no need to sacrifice a human to make the sun come back. The sun is always there.

Sometimes, in our lives, something tries to block out the Son. Whether it is a mental or physical illness, personal struggles with family or finances, a tragedy, or the death of a loved one, something will come along and attempt to disrupt our view of Jesus. It, too, will cast a long shadow over our lives and feel like the darkest of times. It's those times we need to be reminded that the obstruction and the shadows are only temporary.

One of the coolest parts of a total solar eclipse is the peak when the moon is directly in front of the sun. Even then, you can see "the corona," the sun's light peaking around the moon. The sun can never be entirely hidden, and neither can the Son.

Paul tells us in Romans, "am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord." (8:38–39)

Enjoy the eclipse! And when you seem surrounded by shadows and strain to see the light, know that the shadows and darkness are temporary. The Son is eternal.

SESSION NEWS

During our March Session Meeting, the Session heard an update on the work the Transforming Church Initiative work group is doing. Currently, they are looking at our congregation's DNA. In 2023, the Presbyterian Church (USA) added new provisions in our Book of Order, which require an anti-harassment and bullying policy and an anti-racism policy in our Manual of Operations. This policy is in this edition of Steeple Notes.

FPC Huron Anti-Harassment and Anti-Racism Policies

In 2023, the Presbyterian Church (USA) mandated that all congregations include anti-harassment and antiracism policies in their Manual of Operations. Here is the policy approved by the FPC Huron Session. If you have any questions, please contact Pastor Sara or Clerk of Session Marcia Arthur.

Anti-Racism Policy

- Racism is the opposite of what God intends for humanity. It is the rejection of the other, which is entirely contrary to the Word of God incarnate in Jesus Christ. Racism is a lie about our fellow human beings, for it says that some are less than others.
 Because of our biblical understanding of who God is and what God intends for humanity, the PC(USA) must stand against, speak against and work against racism. G-3.0106 requires each Council to adopt an anti-racism policy.
 - As a congregation within the PCUSA we will:
 - Seek to welcome and be open to all people (believers)
 - Educate ourselves to seek awareness of our own behavior and biases and the impact on our community of faith and the wider community.
 - Seek resources (curriculum, worship, preaching and music) which are reflective of all ethnic and racial backgrounds.



Anti-Harassment Policy

- As the Church of Jesus Christ, love is the rule of our relationships.
- Jesus said, "In everything do to others as you would have them do to you; for this is the law and the prophets," (Matt. 7:12), and "By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." (John 13:35).
- The Book of Order states, "The Church is to be a community of love, where sin is forgiven, reconciliation is accomplished, and the dividing walls of hostility are torn down." (F-1.0301, "The Calling of the Church: the Church is the Body of Christ")
- Because we believe this, and because we seek to live it out in all aspects of our personal and corporate life, we believe that harassment in all its forms is incompatible with who we are as followers of Jesus. Harassment is repeated unwanted behavior, including words or actions that demean, threaten, or humiliate another person.
- Cases of harassment should be brought to the attention of the Moderator, Clerk of Session, or Presbytery Executive.
- Upon the receipt of an accusation of harassment, an effort to bring reconciliation will be made.
- If the harasser continues the harassment, the Session may file disciplinary charges per the Book of Order and Presbytery policy.
