From Pastor Sara: How Long?

It's taken a while, but my son has finally found an apartment of his own. When he first moved to Florida, he was the beneficiary of Gail Burke's long am I to be with you? How long hospitality. It took him a couple of months to find lodging he could afford, and he rented a room in a house closer to where he worked. A combination of high housing costs and low housing supply made it nearly impossible for him to find something that was both affordable and decent.

I know he was frustrated with his shoebox. It's not easy to live in someone else's home. I could hear his frustration in our phone conversations, and I would hang up and pray the words of the Psalmist, "How long, O Lord?"

The phrase "How long" appears at least 80 times in the Bible, whether in the Psalms, prophecies, or narratives. King David cried it when he was under siege. Isaiah asked "how long" he must speak.

It's not just humans who want to know how long. About His people, God asked Moses, "How long will these people refuse to keep my

commands?" And when the disciples could not cast out a demon, Jesus said: "O faithless generation, how am I to bear with you?"

It's only natural to want things to be well and settled. And I think the above Scriptures show it's okay to express a sense of impatience and weariness with a situation. I think it's more than okay.

When we open up the parts of our hearts that hurt to God, he can work on us. If we're impatient about something, he can teach us to be patient and to become more trusting of Him. If we fear something and tell God, he can work in our hearts to let us know he walks with us in our fears. We still might have to wait. We still might have to go through an illness, bankruptcy, or other emotionally challenging situations. But our openness to his healing mercy makes all the difference.

Don't be afraid to ask God, "How long?" He might not give you a timeline, but He will give you the peace to help you wait.



Is our reluctance to pray because of the holiness of God? Or is it because of our inadequacy and unworthiness before Almighty God? Yes, we are sinners and, yes, God is great. But assuredly our confidence in prayer rests in

Christ. It is about accessing God's throne through our Great High Priest while He is there pleading for us. We join Christ as He prays for us: He bridges the gap between our humanness and God's almighty holiness. Because we are

in Him, our imperfect prayers become acceptable to God our Father, and our prayers are made known in Heaven. Because of Christ's work God is pleased with us and grants us his attention. He delights to hear our prayers through His Son, and Jesus is always heard because He asks perfectly. Thus, we should draw near to Christ and pray confidently for anything, being thankful for everything from His hand. As Robert Murray M'Cheyne said: "If I could hear Christ praying for me in the next room, I would not fear a million of enemies. Yet the distance makes no difference; he is praying for me." Nothing could be more comforting!

God equipped David for the battle in his own way, and David trusted God. As we continue our TCI work, we discern how God equips us for our ministry. Like David, we shouldn't wear armor that doesn't fit us. Instead, we rejoice in who God made us to be, and live into it, sharing the Gospel in ways that only we can.

In other business, the session approved a motion from the Worship Committee to create a Sanctuary Guild, heard an update on the fall stewardship campaign, and discussed the possibility of adding an overhead microphone so that the choir can be better heard on the live stream. The session will meet next on August 28th at 6:30 p.m.





In some ways, our grief is like being totally unprepared Even though we know our lives are choreographed For this graceful transition from the known to the unknown. So we unwrap poems she wrote and cards she painted, Carefully reviewing each with reverent thanksgiving! I think goodbyes are like colorful kernels of grain. Each has many surprising potentials and powers. They come in warm reds, blues, and yellows. Together, they can be ground into the powerful flour of love That can become dough, which can rise into magical new forms!

This goodbye helps us celebrate what it means to be human.

To live life in full measure as our Creator intends it to be.

It mixes smiles, laughter, thanksgiving, and hope!

It is seasoned with prayer, scripture, shades of pain, and tears!

It explodes with bursts of joy as we listen to God's promises.

Eileen quietly passed on! Memory! Shock! Grief! Celebration!
It's like we are walking by still waters, as the Psalmist did,
Like listening to the mystic voices of Christmas angels,


Eileen Darby dressed this doll in a replica of the outfit she wore at her ordination as an Elder.
